VIII. What have we done well?

The township has maintained a balanced budget while planning for expected and unexpected improvements and has not raised our tax levy for many years. We take pride in the fact that we are the closest form of government to the residents. We help our residents in time of need with rent or mortgage assistance, utilities, transportation to medical appointments, grocery shopping, etc.

Wauconda Township partners with other local, county and state organizations to save taxpayers money and not duplicate services. We offer our community hall to not-for-profit organizations for meetings and events. In addition, we host recycling and shredding events and have an IGA with SWALCO for textile and shoe recycling to help our community "stay green". Additionally, we host Blood Drives and driver's license programs with the Secretary of State.

We also have a Back-to-School backpack program annually that provides school items that are essential for our youth. During the holidays we work with other local groups to provide gift cards and food (turkeys/ hams) to those in need. Our partnership with the Wauconda/Island Lake Food Pantry which uses part of our building serves hundreds of residents monthly.

Our Assessor's Office has worked for many years with all entities of government that are involved with the tax cycle. The Assessor's Office participates in the Lake County

Township Assessor's Association which promotes communication between local offices as well as the County. The Assessor's Office works together with Lake County Chief County Assessor's Office, who has taken a leadership role providing the necessary computer software to facilitate creating assessments. The use of common software equates to better assessments especially when certain areas are located in multiple Townships. Our Assessors have maintained relationships with the County's Map Department, Recorder's Office, Tax Extensions and Treasurer's Office which helps our residents with continuous professional services.

IX. What Can We Do Better or More Efficiently?

We have recently updated our website and made it more user-friendly. We have an enewsletter that goes out every two weeks and we also mail a hard-copy newsletter semi-annually. In addition, our staff mails out the monthly calendar of events that we are either hosting, participating in or providing the transportation to and from. However, we understand that many do not have computers and are looking for other ways to communicate with them.

X. Studies on Government Efficiencies

In preparing this report, we reviewed several studies on local government efficiency. These studies show that:

- The average local government in Illinois serves 1800 residents compared to the national median of 2850 individuals.
- Most townships in Illinois have no bonded indebtedness. Together with Road Districts they are an integral element of local democracy. Township expenditures have grown at a lower rate than those of any other level of government since 1992.
- Townships have lower labor costs and employ mostly part time employees.

WAUCONDA TOWNSHIP ROAD DISTRICT DECENNIAL COMMITEE REPORT

Responsibilities of the Wauconda Township Road District

The Wauconda Road District is responsible for maintaining 31.410miles of road in unincorporated Wauconda Township. Within these unincorporated areas the Highway department is responsible for the Right of Way. The Right of Way includes the road, ditches, driveway aprons, and some drainage easements. Right of Way widths vary and are measured from the center of the road outward to the property line.

Services include snowplowing and de-icing, pavement maintenance including patching, crack filling, shouldering, striping, tree removal and trimming, grass mowing, sign maintenance the highway department, litter pickup, dead animal removal, maintaining drainage ditches, streetlight and mailbox repair, and road bond and right of way permit issuance.

Our plowing crews include 4 full time highway employees and the highway commissioner. Our department runs a fleet of 4 large plow trucks and one smaller one ton all with liquid applying capabilities.

Because of limited budget dollars and to efficiently expend tax dollars, the highway department has intergovernmental agreements with Lake County, local municipalities, and other local townships for purchasing power, equipment sharing, shared equipment purchases, and road maintenance swap to be closer to network of roads and emergency aid.

What have we done weil?

- Administrative Sought and received outside funding for projects that our department could not
 fund internally, adopt employee policy manual, establish overweight/oversize ordinance,
 establish a sign maintenance program, invested in locating equipment and laser transit for storm
 drainage, purchased multiple pieces of equipment with other townships to share costs, updated
 all plow trucks to computer controllers to reduce salt usage, converted building and all
 streetlights to LED to save costs.
- Road maintenance Purchased several skid steer attachments to do in house milling and
 patching, entered into agreements with LCDOT for bulk salt purchasing and roadway striping.
 We've also started a chipping program on the second Monday of every month May-October, and
 we also have free woodchips at the highway garage for residents.
- Snow removal Consolidated snow routes to be more efficient and reduce salt usage. Upgraded the plow blades for better scraping, and outfitted computers/liquid on all trucks as well as rear monitoring cameras for safety.
- Maintenance In house ASE certified mechanic/fabricator to allow our department to maintain vehicles and equipment for a longer useful life.

• **Staffing** - Sign up for available training to further develop our skill set, allowing our department to do more tasks in-house that would otherwise need to be contracted out.

What inefficiencies did we identify?

Our department would like to get a GIS software program to track work to be done and map out all our signs, and storm sewers. We currently have a program through ESRI, but all data needs to be added as we go.

What can we do better?

Our department is always seeking resident input for services they would like to see, and how we could implement those services.
